- the restrictions on distribution of this report.











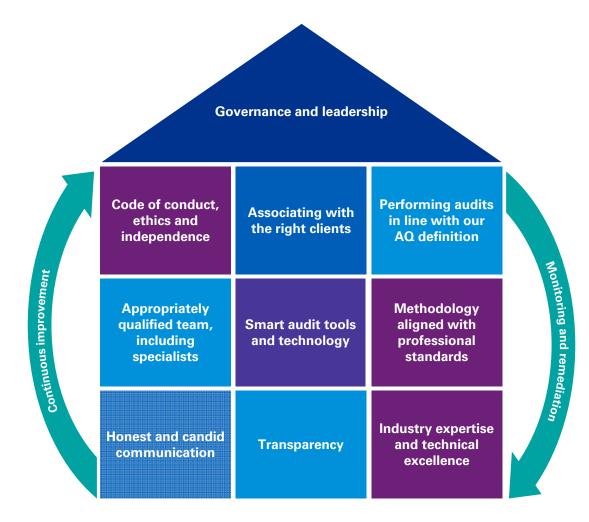








How do we deliver audit quality?

Our audit findings

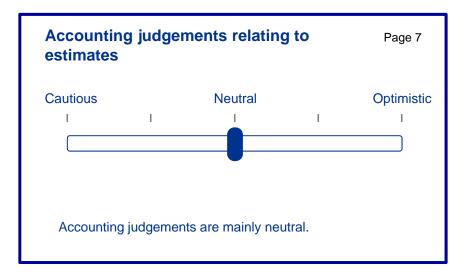
Audit focus areas

Significant risk:

- Risk of error over the preparation financial statements of Pension Scheme in accordance with IAS 26 "Accounting and Reporting by Retirement benefit plans".

Uncorrected audit misstatements

No uncorrected misstatements were identified during our audit.



Control deficiencies

No significant control deficiencies have been identified during our audit that we have concluded are of sufficient importance to merit being reported to those charged with governance.

Identified non-significant control deficiencies will be covered in our management letter, which will be issued in June 2020.





Relevant factors affecting our risk assessment

Complexity





Preparation of financial statements for Pension Scheme in accordance with IAS 26 - "Accounting and Reporting by Retirement Benefit Plans".

Significant risks

 There is a risk of error that IFRS financial statements of Pension Scheme is not in compliance with IAS 26 requirements in all material respects.

Our response

We have performed the following procedures to address the significant risk:

- Reviewed IFRS financial statements (prepared based on IAS 26) of Pension Scheme;
- Ensured that all requirements presented IAS 26 Accounting an Reporting by retirement benefit plants is considered in the financial statements;
- Involved experienced KPMG Engagement Quality Control Reviewer.
- No material misstatements or significant control deficiencies were identified.





Audit focus areas

Relevant factors affecting our risk assessment

Susceptibility to bias/fraud





Management override of controls

Fraud risk related to unpredictable way management override of controls may occur

Significant risks

 Management is in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of its ability to manipulate accounting records and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that otherwise appear to be operating effectively.

Our response

- Identified and tested relevant controls over journal entries and post-closing adjustments.
- Evaluated the appropriateness of the accounting for significant transactions that are outside the component's normal course of business, or are otherwise unusual.
- Identified journal entries and other adjustments with characteristics that make them susceptible to fraud.
- Identified and examined material journal entries and other adjustments posted during the financial statement preparation process.
- No cases of management override of controls have been identified.
