The meeting takes place in Tbilisi, Georgia at the Marriott Tbilisi, 12 - 14 March, 2020.

Overview

Immunization saves up to 3 million lives annually, yet vaccination rates are declining, with misinformation and disinformation on the rise. Accurate health reporting is needed now, more than ever. Journalists can counter these trends with accurate reporting on disease outbreaks and immunization. Reporting on Immunization supports journalists in these efforts by providing training, educational resources and direct access to expert sources to ensure factual and clear reporting.

Sabin Vaccine Institute, in partnership with Thomson Reuters Foundation (TRF) –the international development arm of Thomson Reuters – is conducting a Reporting on Immunization meeting in Tbilisi, Georgia, January 2020. The meeting is designed to generate more effective, accurate and timely coverage of immunization issues in mainstream and social media. The meeting will bring journalists together to engage directly with vaccine scientists, health professionals and policymakers so they are better prepared to accurately report on vaccine and immunization issues in their region. Additionally, TRF educators who specialize in health reporting will provide training on key journalism skills.

After the meeting, the journalists will be provided educational resources, mentoring and direct access to health professionals who are available to serve as expert sources for reporting.

Attendees and Registration Process

TRF will recruit 30 journalists with equal representation from Georgia, Moldova, Armenia, and Azerbaijan (6-7 journalist per country). The application/registration process takes place in two phases.

- (1) First, journalists apply to participate on Thomson Reuters Foundation's (TRF) web site. Not everyone who applies is accepted to participate in the program. TRF will review all applications and then will select 30 qualified applications.
- (2) Second, only after TRF accepts a journalist into the program will they be asked to register on the Sabin's event web site.

Once attendees are confirmed, TRF will work with each media outlet to acquire commitment and senior management buy-in to secure participating journalists' time and commitment to the programme. Efforts



will be made to ensure a diversity of regional representation, age and major wire services/local news outlets.

Prior to the meeting, attendees will complete a pre-course questionnaire to capture expectations, challenges, baseline knowledge, and issues they would like addressed during training. A post-course questionnaire will be administered to assess lessons learned and determine whether expectations were met.

Preliminary Agenda and Topics

Reporting on Immunization is a 3-day course and includes lectures, breakout groups and case study presentations. The program will begin with education regarding immunization, vaccine efficacy and safety, and regional challenges. The remaining agenda will focus on TRF's journalism curriculum and will include breakout sessions with hands-on skills building exercises.

Ongoing Activities

After the Reporting on Immunization meeting, participants will be provided with educational resources and access to health professionals who have agreed to serve as expert sources to help them shape accurate media coverage. Expert sources include health and immunization professionals from the participating countries (Georgia, Moldova, Armenia, and Azerbaijan) and global experts. TRF will facilitate post-workshop mentoring for selected participants, including a \$300 honorarium for those selected in support of their continued work on their topic. TRF trainers will select participants for mentoring based on their ability and engagement during the Reporting on Immunization meeting. Mentoring involves one-on-one guidance for journalists and is provided remotely. The aim of the mentoring is to help the participating journalists produce multiple stories on topics related to immunization.
